Although this volume was written by Beach and is smaller in format than the other quarto-sized volumes, this comprehensive work on apples was part of the "Fruits of New York" series written by U. P. Hedrick. Name on fly of Vol.1 and on title of Vol.2. Binding is in exceptionally good condition.

This monthly calendar of work to be done in the flower garden was first issued in 1832 and was co-authored by Thomas Hibbert and Robert Buist who were partners in a greenhouse and florist business located in Philadelphia. After Hibbert's death Buist added seed selling to the business operations and became one of the most successful seedsmen in the U.S. This title was issued in a number of editions and was the first book published in this country that was readily usable to gardeners. The "New Edition" offered here is the same as the 1839 second edition except for the final advertisements for English books available in Philadelphia at the time, which have been reset. \$150.00

One of the most popular 19th century works on grape growing due to the information it gave on growing grapes under glass. The book went through four editions and was reprinted into the 20th century. The first edition of this work, published in 1852, included a 32-page "Calendar of Operations," which was dropped in this second edition published in 1856.

LANDMARK EARLY DUTCH WORK ON GARDEN DESIGN

Speckled wraps worn and chipped, waterstain on lower inner corner of first several leaves, unopened. An 18th century printed planting chart ("Nieuwe Nauwkeurige Hovenir") with the imprint "Utrecht, by Justus Visch" measuring 21" wide x 17" tall is folded and laid in. The chart contains hand-numbering on the recto and monthly manuscript notes in Dutch on the verso.

The first edition of this landmark work on fruit growing, hothouses, and country gardening which is also considered the first original Dutch work on the theory of garden design. It was reprinted and translated in a number of subsequent editions. Though published anonymously, the author was Pieter de la Court van der Voort (1664-1739), a Dutch merchant known as the first garden theorist of the Netherlands. He was particularly fond of pineapples and grew them in his glasshouse. The book discusses the laying out of pleasure grounds as well as the technicalities of heating glasshouses. The lovely fruit plates show fruits on their stems as well as cross-sections. They were done by Jan Wandelaar (who did the engravings for Linnaeus' Hortus Cliffortianus) and J. C. Phillips. Very good, uncut copy of the first edition of this landmark work.

(#5 - cont.) Cobbett, whose horticultural works *The English Gardener* (1829) and *The American Gardener* (1821) are familiar to many, also wrote on political topics as well, which he published in his *Political Register*, a publication which had been called "two-penny trash." He apparently embraced this description and continued publishing his thoughts on the politics of the time using it as its new title. The April and May 1832 issues include a 2pp. advertisement for seeds and Cobbett's corn. With a 12pp. listing of Cobbett's books laid in. Remarkably poor copy lacking backstrip, covers detached, first and last several leaves loose, foxed. Priced accordingly. \$50.00

Originally published in 1876 and based on the author's lectures in his popular beekeeping course at Michigan Agricultural College, this work went through 19 "editions." Two main sections: on the natural history of the honey bee and the care of the apiary. With a 38pp. section on honey plants. Binding worn, hinges cracked but covers holding and text block tight. Lacks front free endpaper, slightly shaken. Good. \$40.00

The portfolio consists of 15 separate prints of the same illustrations as in the book, in the same size, but all printed in black ink. Boston 1972. David R. Godine.

Hnizdovsky (1915-1985) was a Ukrainian artist who moved to the United States in 1949 where he devoted himself to creating woodcuts, etchings and other works on paper. He is known primarily for his highly stylized woodcuts of plants and animals as well as for his bookplate designs. Hnizdovsky was commissioned by Godine to create the prints for this book which was published in 1970 in an edition of 3,500 copies. A paperback edition and at least two limited editions were also issued. The portfolio of plates was also issued separately The present edition is a bit of a mystery as most copies with the accompanying portfolio are signed by the illustrator while this copy is not. Fine copy of a work seldom found with the portfolio of prints. \$200.00

Full calf, scuffed, covers slightly warped, foxed, edges chipped on first several leaves. Name of "Samuel G. Fauntleroy, M.D., April 1833" on endpaper, title and p.3. Fauntleroy (1791-1857) practiced medicine in Virginia after graduating from the Medical College of the University of Pennsylvania. Good+.

Ellis (1798 - 1831) was a professor of Materia Medica and Pharmacy at Philadelphia College of Pharmacy. His Formulary, first published in 1826, appeared in a number of later editions, and was issued to field physicians during the Civil War. The formulas are arranged in chapters by the kind of action produced (e.g., emetics, expectorants, stimulants, narcotics, etc.). Plants are used in a number of the formulas. \$125.00

As usual, a number of pages are misnumbered including three leaves that are pagi-

nated p.29/30 [details of pagination and collation available on request]. Also, as usual, this copy lacks one preliminary and one rear leaf (P1 and 7B6), both of which are blanks - see Hunt. The verso of the last leaf contains errata. Nicely rebound in modern full paneled calf with tooled panels, gilt-tooled spine with five raised bands and red leather spine label, new endpapers. Some browning to first and last leaves. Very light occasional damp staining mostly to upper margin on approximately 300 leaves. Several well-done repairs using Japanese paper.

John Gerard (1545-1612), an English barber/surgeon and botanist, first published his Herbal in 1597. It was based on Rembert Dodoens' Stirpium Historiae Pemptades Sex (1583) and utilized the plant classification system of Mattias de l'Obel. This second edition, published in 1633, was thoroughly revised by Thomas Johnson, an apothecary and botanist, who corrected the numerous errors found in the first edition. Johnson devised a method for noting in the text the degree to which he edited or added to Gerard's descriptions, thus enabling the reader to distinguish between the two authors. Most of the woodcuts for the first edition were from blocks used to illustrate Tabernaemontanus' Eicones (1590); this second edition used woodblocks from the well-known Antwerp publisher, Plantin, and was greatly enhanced thereby. Of note is the fact that Gerard's Herbal was the first work in which an illustration of the potato appears. Popular throughout the 17th and 18th centuries, the work contains descriptions, habitat, medicinal and other uses for some 2.850 plants. A very nice copy of a landmark herbal. \$5.500.00

Charles Romain Feburier was a member of the Societe d'Agiculture de la Seine-et-Oise and the author of several books on bees as well as several short works on other subjects such as tulips, the harrow and the greater wax moth.

A short-lived periodical, published in nine volumes from 1833 to 1842, just before the potato famine. Articles on agricultural topics include various crops, husbandry, the corn laws, land stewards' account books, etc. Also included are articles on horticultural subjects such as ornamental gardening in County Limerick, an article on the diseases of ornamental plants by George W. Johnson of Maryland, reports from various Irish horticultural societies, the cultivation of the auricula, ericas, greenhouse plants, dahlias, etc. There are several articles on the failure of potato crops in Ireland, these occurring just six years before the 1845 potato famine which decimated the Irish population: "As the failure of potatoes is continuing, and having prevailed to some extent this last season, I would take the liberty of suggesting and enquiring as to the cause..." Musa Cliffortiana was Linnaeus' first monograph and was written while he oversaw the extensive gardens at George Clifford's estate, the Hartenkamp, in Holland. Linnaeus was able to replicate tropical growing conditions in a glasshouse on the estate and grew the banana there, observing it and taking notes for this work in which he describes the banana, its botany, history, attributes and uses. This is the first modern translation of the work and is accompanied by an introduction giving important historical context to the work. \$125.00

Rebound in 3/4 paneled calf with six raised bands and gilt device in each spine panel, gilt-lettered red morocco label, new endpapers. There is a 2" wide by 1/2" tall portion of the lower margin of the frontispiece missing (not affecting image). The frontispiece has been nicely re-margined. One plate has been reinforced on verso. Unobtrusive 1" x 3/4" oval stamp of the Homerton College Society on the title. Some offsetting onto plates and from plates onto text (more prominent in the second half of the book). Small hole on p.223/224 affecting a few letters on p.224. The Homerton College Society was established in 1730 as a school for educating "Protestant dissenters" for Christian Ministry. It is now a college of the University of Cambridge. VG.

Sir John Hill (circa 1716-1775) was a physician, apothecary, and prolific writer on many subjects including natural history and the theater. He was a controversial figure in his time and his strong opinions alienated a number of the period's scholars, scientists and artists. He first published the small paper edition of this work in 52 parts between January 1756 and January 1757; it was then bound into one volume. The large paper edition was issued in 52 weekly parts beginning in January 1757. The work is noteworthy for being one of the first botanical books published after the introduction of Linnaean nomenclature as well as for its criticism of Linnaeus' classification system. Hill is probably best known for his impressive 246-volume botanical work The Vegetable System (1759-1775) which he completed under the patronage of Lord Bute. A very nice copy. \$1,850.00

La Quintinye (1626-1688) was Louis XIV's chief gardener for 25 years. This work, originally published posthumously by the author's son in 1690, had a tremendous influence on the practice of kitchen gardening. La Quintinye was an early advocate for what we would now call the "edible garden," and was known for his development of pruning techniques that increased fruit production. According to H. Frederic Janson (Pomona's Harvest, 1996) there were some 12 French editions published between 1690 and 1760. In this edition, there is a 92pp. section giving La Quintinye's reflections on agriculture as well as a 196pp. section on flowers. John Evelyn, a good friend of La Quintinye's, translated the book into English as The Compleat Gard'ner in 1693. OCLC lists several 1739 editions published by four different publishers but none published "Chez Damonneville" as here.

(25 - cont.) A later printing of the first U.S. edition of this British work, which was originally published in 1852 under the title Parks and Pleasure Grounds. Smith states that his intent here was to popularize the principles of Wheatley, Price, and Gilpin while contributing his own observations from nature. Lewis F. Allen's contributions clarify points where the U.S. climate and soil differ from the British. \$175.00

In this work, Stern includes descriptions of species, keys, classification, cultivation, distribution, etc. The work also includes a detailed 25pp, chapter on the history of peony literature. \$350.00

28. Wilson, William - A TREATISE ON THE FORCING OF EARLY FRUITS, and the Management of Hot Walls. pp.(2),44. Rebound in modern paper over boards. 16mo. Henrey #1502. London 1777. G. Robinson.

William Wilson was a Scotsman who was gardener to Sir James Cockburn in Petersham, Surrey when he wrote this work; he was later the gardener to the Earl of Glasgow. The first 24pp. concern peaches and nectarines; the rest is devoted to grape vines and strawberries. John Loudon called this work "a useful little treatise" (Encyclopedia of Gardening, 1822, p.1277). Early marginal notations in a clear hand; unfortunately, the edges have been cropped so that some of the notations are partially missing though many have been reconstructed and penciled in. Two pages of manuscript notes in a very clear hand dated September 14, 1782 are tipped in at the rear, with small slip of manuscript notes in a similar hand tipped in at p.15. The notes concern smoking fruit trees in the hot-house with tobacco smoke and pruning grape vines. Very good copy of a scarce work. \$425.00

Wooster (circa 1824-1888) was a British nurseryman who collaborated with J. C. Loudon on his Encyclopedia of Plants. The present work was written to offer an alternative to the then popular fashion of bedding out, with its massed plantings of a limited number of showy plants. A second series of alpine plants was compiled and published in a similar format two years later. \$150.00
