



1. Cecil, The Hon. Mrs. Evelyn (Alicia Amherst) - A HIS-TORY OF GARDENING IN ENGLAND. Third and Enlarged Edition. Illustrated with a number of b&w plates showing historical portraits, plans, gardens, book illustrations, etc. pp.xviii,393. Gilt-stamped cloth. With original printed dust jacket (browned and worn along edges). London 1910. John Murray.

Alicia M. T. Amherst (1865-1941) published this history in 1895 and included with it a chronological bibliography of British gardening books published from 1516-1837. A sec-

ond edition with corrections and some additions to the bibliography was issued the next year. In 1898 she married Evelyn Cecil and published this third and final edition using his surname. The third edition includes additional information from the author's continued research and adds a number of titles to the bibliography, which comprises 46 pages. When her son was knighted as Baron Rockley, she became Lady Rockley under which name she wrote a number of other horticultural titles. <u>A History of Gardening in England</u> was among the first works on the subject and because of its scholarly and methodical approach it helped legitimate the study of garden history. 2. Chaptal, John Antony - CHYMISTRY APPLIED TO AGRICULTURE. First American, Translated from the Second French Edition. pp.xl,356. Full calf. Boston 1835. Hilliard, Gray & Co.

Worn calf, spine ends bumped, hinge cracked, writing on endpaper, rear blank torn, foxing. Bookplate of the wellknown book collector, Marcus Crahan.

Jean-Antoine Chaptal (1756-1832) was a French statesman, industrialist and agronomist who wrote a number of works on how to apply scientific principles to the practice of agriculture. First published in 1823 as Chimie Appliquée à



<u>l'Agriculture</u>, the work offered here describes the nature of soil, manure, etc., then discusses plant nourishment and the principles of crop succession. Chaptal also includes chapters on the preservation and uses of vegetable products, fermentation, distillation, and the cultivation of the beet root. Chaptal's political sympathies were in harmony with the United States so much so that he wrote the present work on agricultural chemistry in part to help the French peasantry become "independent farmers" as in America. 3. Clarke Nursery; W. B. Clarke & Co., Owners -GARDEN ARISTOCRATS. Lot of 16 issues: Vol.1 1934 – Vol.16 1949. Illustration on front wrap. Approximately 20pp. each. Wraps. San Jose, CA 1934-1949.

Some issues soiled; some with notation on front wrap.

In the early 1930's the Clarke Nursery imported woody plants from England and other countries, but because of business uncertainties during the Depression nurserymen in the U.S. were largely unwilling to take the risk in purchasing unfamiliar plants in bulk. Clarke Nursery therefore decided to advertise them directly to consumers via this pamphlet. The lot of 16 - \$75.00

Armorial bookplate of Don A. Canovas del Častillo, small (1" round) early ex-libris stamp on wraps and on first and last leaves. Antonio Canovas del Castillo (1828-1897) was an author, historian, and influential Spanish Prime Minister

whose repressive policies contributed to the outbreak of the Spanish-American War. He was assassinated by an anarchist in 1897.

This is the cornerstone bio-bibliography of Spanish and Portuguese botany, with some 900 items from the 15th to the 19th centuries included. Bibliography to p.139; rest contains short biographies. In Spanish. A very good copy of this landmark work with a significant provenance. In a lovely full leather binding. \$150.00

5. Cullen, William - TREATISE OF THE MATERIA MEDICA. With Large Additions, Including Many New Articles, Wholly Omitted in the Original Work by Benjamin Smith Barton, M.D. [Fourth American edition]. Two volumes. pp.xxiv,319: (1-title; 1-half-title), 424. Period calf, modern cloth re-backing with new leather spine labels. Philadelphia, PA 1812. Published by Edward Parker.

Calf sides are worn and scuffed, text browned and foxed. Name of "W. R. Waring" in a 19th century hand on front paste-down endpaper of Vol. 2. Doctor W. R. Waring was a



successful physician in Savannah as well as a professor of anatomy at Savannah Medical College and the author of a paper on yellow fever.

William Cullen (1712-1790) was a professor of medicine at the University of Edinburg and was known for introducing the term "neurosis" to the clinical literature. He first published this treatise in London in 1773. The first American edition was published in Philadelphia in 1775; the second edition appeared in 1789, and the third in 1808 (these last two editions were reprints of the first edition). The scarce fourth American edition offered here contains numerous additions and corrections by the Philadelphia physician, Benjamin Smith Barton, professor of natural history and botany at the College of Philadelphia and the University of Pennsylvania. Barton is known for writing the first botanical textbook published in the United States, his Elements of Botany (Philadelphia 1803).

Cullen's Treatise of the Materia Medica begins with a 36pp. chapter on the history of materia medica followed by introductory chapters and a dictionary of general terms. The bulk of the work is divided into two sections: aliments (i.e., substances taken into the body) and medicines. The section on aliments comprises 149 pages, of which 47 pages concern fruits, vegetables, grasses, etc. The section on medicines, which comprises all of Vol.2 and is arranged by action (e.g., astringents, tonics, emetics, stimulants, etc.), includes many made from plants. Barton's preface notes that his own additions to the work "are, indeed, pretty numerous;" he describes the chief categories of his changes saying that "they will render the work more useful to the student of medicine." Vol.1 #1 July 1846 – Vol.3 #12 June 1849. The first three volumes. Monthly. Total of 36 b&w plates (most showing rural cottages with ground plans), numerous text engravings. Approximately 575pp. each. Albany, NY. Luther Tucker.



A mixed set of three volumes, each bound in ³/₄

calf with marbled sides. Bindings scuffed. Vol.1 & 3 with marbled endpapers. Vol.2 several plates browned. Vol.3 with a botanical library bookplate (though with no other library markings) plus pencil name on fly, water-stain on title only, lower corner of p.13/14 missing (not affecting text).

The Horticulturist was one of the foremost horticultural periodicals of the time, begun by the "father of landscape architecture" in this country, A. J. Downing, and edited by him until his death in 1851. It was continued under various editors until 1875 when it was combined with The Gardener's Monthly. These are the first three volumes of this informative and influential periodical. \$300.00

A touring guide arranged by time period; English text. This popular work was issued by several publishers in 1926 and again in a 1960 reprint. This English edition printed in France by J. Rey is quite scarce. Good. \$25.00

8. GARDENERS' CHRONICLE. A Weekly. Volume 85 1929 - Volume 90 1931 (lacking two issues) plus 1934. A total of 206 issues, in original parts, and printed on coated paper so they are quite heavy. The periodical was issued in two volumes per year, each volume containing about 475pp. Illustrated with a featured color plate in most numbers and with b&w photos and text illustrations. Folio. London.



Gardeners' Chronicle was begun in 1841 and was issued in three series: Series 1 1841 - 1873; Series 2 1874 - 1886; and Series 3 1887-1976. The run offered here, from Series 3, provides a record of the gardening news and newsmakers of the early 1930's. Regular features include news from various horticultural societies (including some in the U. S., e.g., "Severe Weather at the Arnold Arboretum," reporting on temperatures of 17 degrees below zero, the coldest spell they'd had since 1640, issue #4855 January 1934), short articles on a variety of gardening topics, obituaries, biographies, work to be done in the garden, etc. Most issues include a longer article on various plant exploring expeditions. Some of these reports were serialized, and provide fascinating reading. Full of advertisements. Rusting in gutters from the stapled binding, but generally VG. The run - \$150.00 9. Asa Gray wrote some 1,100 book notices and re-

views of scientific publications between 1834 and 1887 and Sargent has expertly culled the ones he believes represent both the important trends in botany during the period and Gray's intellect and vision. Also included are 38 biographical sketches of eminent botanists plus several other essays on botanical subjects. Fair set. \$30.00

11. Hereman, Samuel, Assisted by a Nobleman's Gardener - BLIGHT ON FLOWERS; Or, Figures and Descriptions of the Insects Infesting the Flower Garden; Including Various Means for Destroying Those Which by Their Depredations Occasion Many of the Diseases of Plants. Also, Copious Directions for the Successful Management of All Kinds of Flowers Whether in the Hothouse, Greenhouse, or Open Air. Comprises "Gardener's Library" Vol. 2, and was

issued complete in itself. Frontispiece and 17 hand-colored plates, most showing flowers, but some showing conservatories and garden stoves. pp.(1-title, 1-dedication, vii-viii-preface, ix-x- index, 1-index to illustrations, ii-introduction), 242, (2publisher's adverts.). Text pages browned, moderate browning around margins of plates, several plates with moderate foxing and two with heavy foxing. The coloring of the plates is generally good throughout, though some are less precise in the application of color. Corners and spine ends bumped, rear joint split 1" at top and 2" at bottom, rear hinge cracked but binding is not compromised. Lacks front free endpaper. Fair.

Samuel Hereman was secretary to Sir Joseph Paxton for almost forty years and edited a revised edition of Paxton's Botanical Dictionary in 1868. He also wrote A Handbook of Vine and Fruit Tree Cultivation As Adapted to Sir Joseph Paxton's

(11 - cont.) <u>Patent Hothouses</u> (1862). The work offered here, <u>Blight on Flowers</u>, was later published for the author in Liverpool, 1842, by W. Taylor. Name of "F. V. Theobald, Coye Court, Wye" inside cover. Frederick Vincent Theobald (1868-1930) was an entomologist, a professor and an expert on mosquitos. He wrote <u>The Insect</u> <u>& Other Allied Pests of Orchard, Bush & Hothouse Fruits</u> (1909). Fair copy with an interesting association. \$50.00



12. HOME GARDEN. Vol.1 1943 - Vol.22 1953. (lacking 25 of the issues, mostly from 1950 & 1951). Includes separate Indexes for Vols. 1, 3-6, 8 & 9 (Indexes for Vol.3 & 4 are facsimile copies). Monthly (6 issues per volume). Photos (some color) and drawings. Approximately 96pp. per issue. Wraps. Concord, NH 1943-1953.

Volumes 1-6 in original green printed cloth binders; rest are loose issues.

<u>Home Garden</u> began publication in 1943 and ceased publication as a separate journal in December 1953; it then merged with <u>Flower Grower</u> magazine. Articles are by the leading writers of the World War II and post-War years, including R. C. Allen, Alex Laurie, Donald Wyman, F. F. Rockwell, Montague Free, and Helen van Pelt Wilson. A fairly complete run of this periodical that charted the trends in home gardening in the decade following World War II. A total of 107 issues - \$50.00

A scarce work on the medicinal plants, trees and shrubs predominantly of France but of other countries as well. It is arranged by disease, and contains brief notes on how the plant is used. Includes an alphabetical index of plants with page references to the diseases for which they are used. OCLC lists a total of six copies held in libraries, only one of which is held in the U.S. Very good. \$400.00

First American edition. 204 text illustrations showing landscape scenes, garden designs, elevations, garden features such as bridges, etc. pp.xxxi,403,4-book catalogue. Green stamped cloth with elaborate gilt-stamped cover and spine bound by Geo. W. Alexander in NY, with his

ticket, all edges gilt. NY 1858. Wiley & Halsted.

Printed bookplate of Mary K. Moulton, Landscape Designer and Consultant, on front endpaper, 3/4" decorative stamp of the initials "MC" in a burnt sienna color on title with offsetting to front fly.

This is the first American edition of a popular British work which was first published in 1850. The landscape designs are taken from the author's own practice as a landscape gardener. The publisher cautions the reader in the preface that not all of the plants suggested in the work are adaptable to North American conditions, but hopes that the examples of good taste illustrated by Mr. Kemp's treatise will justify its being published in this country. It was later revised by F. A. Waugh adapting it to our climate and published under the title Landscape Gardening. A nicely preserved copy. VG+. \$60.00

Original leather binding, rebacked with most of original spine, corners bumped, new endpapers, edges of first leaves worn, stain on lower corner of first 117pp., some foxing. VG.

This is essentially an updated version of Charles Estienne's <u>Praedium Rusticum</u>, which was originally published in 1554 and was later issued by his son-in-law,



John Liebault, as La Maison Rustique (1564). The work comprises a compendium of the many facets of rural life including agriculture, husbandry, household management, crops, bee-keeping, fruits and fruit trees, the pleasure garden, etc. A third edition was titled La Nouvelle Maison Rustique (1721) and was issued many times throughout the rest of the 18th century. Louis Liger (1658–1717) was a well-known author of books on flora and fauna including the very popular gardening manual, Le Jardiniere Fleuriste, 1704.

James Maddock (circa 1715-1786) was a well-known nurseryman and florist at Walworth, near London, who issued an annual catalogue of the plants he sold. He wrote this work to guide florists and interested laypeople in the cultivation requirements for the "finer" florist's flowers, i.e., the hyacinth, tulip, ranunculus, anemone, auricula, carnation, pink and polyanthus. The book was first published posthumously in this 1792 edition with six plates. It was revised by Samuel Curtis, William Curtis's first cousin, in 1810. The last edition was issued by Samuel Curtis in 1822. Henrey notes "The Florist's Directory remained the best English work on florists' flowers until Thomas Hogg," whose treatise on florists' flowers appeared in 1820. \$500.00

Presumably a calf binding although a hand-stitched cloth wrapper was sewn around it sometime in the 19th century in such a way that the original binding can not be determined without destroying the wrapper. Hinges cracked, crack in the text block in the index portion of the book although the cords are still holding. A small portion of the lower inner corner of frontispiece is missing (not affecting image), a few tears in some leaves, mild foxing. A good minus copy, priced accordingly.

This was a very popular practical horticulture manual that was first published in 1767 and was published in over 28 editions well into the mid-19th century. The book is a compendium of monthly garden work focusing on the kitchen and fruit gardens, but also including information on the greenhouse and flower gardens, with plant lists for each. \$40.00

Calf, quite worn and scuffed, front joint worn through but cover not detaching, moderate foxing throughout, top of leaves water-stained, two 2" tears in fold-out table (affecting a few letters). Intaglio book-stamp of the horticultural author, Denise W. Adams, on front free endpaper, penciled name inside rear cover, 19th century inscription at top of title "Silas Cornell sold to John Dove." Good.

M^MAahon (1775-1818) was an Irishman who came to America in 1796, settling in Philadelphia where he established a nursery and seed business. Arranged in monthly sections, the book describes all necessary gardening operations and then lists hundreds of plants in what Hedrick calls "the best, if not the only, statement of the plant material in America at that time" (History of Horticulture in America, pp.197-198). Although not all of the plants were available here, M'Mahon does state that he is able to supply many of them. This influential work, which appeared in 11 editions between 1806 and 1857, was the first comprehensive gardening book published in the U.S. and provides a fascinating window into early American gardening practices. \$250.00

A detailed work describing how to use various bonsai training techniques. Includes charts for soil mixtures, chapters on daily and monthly care, etc. This printing added a 7pp. Index to the work not included in the first printing. <u>INSCRIBED</u> by



the author on half-title, dated Feb. 15, 1977, with his red chop seal. VG+ condition. This edition is becoming scarce. \$75.00



20. New Jersey Horticultural Society - PROCEED-INGS. 7 years: 1905 (30th Annual Session), 1906, 1912, 1913, 1915, 1916, 1918. Some b&w photos. Approximately 175pp. each. Years 1905 and 1906 with covers spotted. Trenton, NJ.

Includes reports of the Fruit, Flower, and Vegetable Committees. These volumes provide a glimpse of what was happening in the "Garden State" leading up to World War I. VG. The lot of 7 volumes - \$30.00

Wraps chipped and foxed, front wrap torn along spine. Generally VG.

Northrup, who was Secretary of the Connecticut Board of Education, travelled to Europe and reported his observations on forestry practices and forestry education abroad. He was especially interested in the reclamation of waste lands by tree planting. "The

evils of widespread forest denudation both as regards climatic changes, uniform flow of springs and streams, devastation by mountain torrents, and the exhaustion of once fertile lands, have been long and sadly felt in the Old World." A scarce work. \$35.00

22. Rawle, William - AN ADDRESS Delivered before the Philadelphia Society for Promoting Agriculture: at its Anniversary Meeting, January 19, 1819. 35pp. Original blue wraps, sewn, untrimmed. Philadelphia, PA 1819. Philadelphia Society for Promoting Agriculture.

The topic is immigration and its impact on agriculture.

Rawle (1759-1836), a Quaker abolitionist, practiced law in Pennsylvania and in 1805 argued before the Supreme Court against the constitutionality of slavery. In this treatise, he begins with a brief discussion on the forced "immigration" of convicts and slaves, and the forced "migration" of native Americans. He then argues that immigrants who have horticultural and agricultural skills are the most valuable to the United States and should be encouraged to settle here. Though held by numerous libraries, this item is relatively rare in commerce. \$50.00

Johann Rudolf Suter (1766-1827) was a Swiss botanist, physician and the author of the two-volume work, *Flora Helvetica* (1802).

Jean-Francis Seguier (1703-1784) was a French botanist and historian who toured Europe widely and visited as many public and private libraries as he could in order to compile this comprehensive bibliography of botanical books and journal articles. The bulk of the work (450pp.) is arranged in three subject sections: herbals; medicines made from plants, and rural matters including gardening. It also includes a 40pp. index of plants with associated authors, although this index is, as Stafleu states, "singularly impractical because the reference is only to authors' names and not to pages, or even to the three main parts." A second edition by Haak in Leiden was published in 1760.

Also bound with Seguier's work is Giovanni Antonio Bumaldi's (also known as Ovidio Montalbani) bibliography of grasses. This work accounts for the last 74pp.

Very good copy of an early and comprehensive pre-Linnaean botanical bibliography, with a notable provenance. \$750.00

Warder was the editor of the <u>Western Horticultural</u> <u>Review</u> and President of the Cincinnati Horticultural Society. He notes in the preface that since "fences of some kind being one of the recognized institutions of our country... I here beg to offer that agreeable alternative - the useful, the economical, the practical, and at the same time, the ornamental, Live-Fence or Hedge." Initial chapters discuss the reasons for using hedges



and the selection of hedge plants for various purposes (barrier, screening, windbreak, etc.). He also includes an interesting 22pp. chapter on the "Jurisprudence of Fences" describing laws in various states. The book concludes with a 60pp. section describing various evergreens for use in "shelter, economy, and ornament." \$40.00
